2021 Commercial Fisheries Sector *Review*



The commercial fisheries sector is a vital component of the social and economic fabric of the province, particularly in many rural, coastal, and indigenous communities. In 2021, the fishing fleet of 2,152 vessels harvested 74,020 tonnes of fish and seafood for a value of \$634.0 million. In terms of fish and seafood species, lobster and snow crab account for 94 per cent of the value of commercial landings in New Brunswick. The province is the processing hub for many seafood products. New Brunswick is the second largest exporter of fish and seafood products in the country valued at \$2.21 billion in 2021. The main export destination is the United States with 88 per cent of the export value. In terms of employment, the fisheries sector generated about 2,250 and 4,520 full-year equivalent jobs in harvesting and processing activities, respectively.

2021 HIGHLIGHTS

- New Brunswick's commercial fisheries landings increased in value by \$262.4 million (71 per cent), from \$371.6 million in 2020 to a record-high \$634.0 million in 2021, as the industry rebounded strongly from the pandemic.
- The value of lobster landings rose significantly by \$178.3 million (74 per cent) to \$420.1 million in 2021. This resulted from a 63-per-cent rise in average price, from \$11.46/kg in 2020 to \$18.62/kg in 2021, coupled with a seven-per-cent increase in landed volume, from 21,109 tonnes to 22,567 tonnes.
- Snow crab landings value nearly doubled (up \$87.8 million), from \$88.8 million in 2020 to \$176.6 million in 2021. This was due to a significant rise in average price, by \$9.89/kg (129 per cent) to \$17.53/kg, outweighing a decrease in landed volume, by 1,549 tonnes (13 per cent) to 10,072 tonnes.
- Herring landings were valued at \$8.8 million in 2021, down 46 per cent (\$7.5 million) from 2020, as a result of lower prices and volume. The average price fell 34 per cent to \$0.46/kg in 2021, while landed volume decreased by 19 per cent to 19,210 tonnes.
- The value of scallop landings increased by \$0.8 million (11 per cent) to \$8.8 million in 2021, as a result of higher prices outweighing lower landed volume. Note, Fisheries and Oceans Canada converts all landings into live weight, which includes the shell for scallops. Compared to 2020, the average price of muscle meat rose by 39 per cent, from \$16.70/kg to \$23.21/kg in 2021, while landed volume fell by one-fifth, from 475 tonnes to 378 tonnes.

- Shrimp landings totaled \$6.7 million in 2021, up \$0.3 million (five per cent) compared to 2020. This was due to a rise in average price, by \$0.37/kg (18 per cent) to \$2.42/kg, outweighing a decline in volume, by 346 tonnes (11 per cent) to 2,776 tonnes.
- New Brunswick exported a record-high \$2.21 billion worth of seafood products (including aquaculture) in 2021. Compared to 2020, seafood exports were up 60 per cent (\$828.6 million), as COVID-19 restrictions were lifted and markets recovered. Export sales of lobster, salmon, and crab increased the most.
- Lobster exports rose by \$547.3 million (79 per cent) to an all-time high \$1.24 billion in 2021; while salmon sales increased by \$159.3 million (66 per cent) to \$401.4 million; and crab exports grew by \$110.1 million (43 per cent) to reach \$364.6 million.
- New Brunswick's seafood exports to the United States grew by \$771.8 million (66 per cent) to total \$1.94 billion in 2021.
 Other top markets that saw increases in 2021 include China, by \$24.8 million (96 per cent), Hong Kong, by \$6.4 million (56 per cent), and South Korea, by \$6.2 million (47 per cent).






