Climate Change Impacts in New Brunswick

New Brunswick is already experiencing the impacts of climate change and it will get worse.



Warmer.

- average temperatures
- ↑ extreme heat above 30°C
- ↑ public health impacts (e.g. heat stress)



Wetter.

- ↑ extreme precipitation
- ↑ damage to homes, properties and roads
- ↑ risk of flooding



Stormier.

- ↑ extreme weather
- ↑ power outages
- ↑ damage to homes, power lines and other infrastructure



Rising sea levels.

- ↑ 1m for coastal areas by 2100
- ↑risk of coastal flooding and erosion
- ↑loss of natural areas such as dunes, beaches, and wetlands

ways you can REDUCE your carbon footprint

- Reduce your home's energy consumption by purchasing energy efficient appliances and enrolling in Save Energy NB Programs.
- Heat and cool your home with efficient and renewable energy like heat-pumps, geothermal and solar panels.
- Make climate-smart transportation and commuting choices like walking, biking, public transit or carpooling.
- Take advantage of government incentives and purchase a hybrid or electric vehicle and charge your vehicle at home overnight during off-peak hours.
- Reduce your food footprint by purchasing local and remembering to waste less food through meal planning, saving leftovers and composting what's left.
