

Just Over One-Quarter of New Brunswickers Use at Least Two Languages in the Workplace

A **language** is **used most often at work** when it is used either predominantly or equally with one or more other languages. If it is not used most often at work, it may still be used on a regular basis. The general use of a language combines its 'predominant use' or its 'use on an equal basis with other languages' with its regular use.

- In 2006, about 110,000 New Brunswickers reported using more than one language at work, or 26.2% of the population aged 15 and over who were employed between January 1, 2005 and May 16, 2006. This was a slight increase from 2001 (25.4% or roughly 103,000 individuals), the first census that collected statistics on language of work.
- In 2006, 93.3% of Francophones in New Brunswick reported using French at work, the highest proportion (after Quebec) in Canada. Of the 138,000 Francophone workers in the province, 75.0% spoke French most often at work in 2006 (75.8% in 2001) and 18.3% used it regularly at work (16.5% in 2001).
- The use of English in the workplace in New Brunswick, most often or on a regular basis, increased to 88.1% in 2006, up slightly from 87.8% in 2001. This was also the case for all of Canada, where the proportions were 85.0% and 84.7% respectively.
