

### **WEEKLY NEW BRUNSWICK INFLUENZA REPORT**

Reporting period: January 2, 2011 – January 8, 2011 (week 1)

# Summary Low influenza activity and nine positive influenza detections in New Brunswick

In New Brunswick, the ILI consultation rate in week 1 increased compared to the previous week and was below the expected range for this time of year. There have been 9 positive influenza detections during week 1, one pandemic influenza A (H1N1), five influenza A (H3) and three influenza A unsubtyped. No ILI/influenza outbreaks were reported for week 1.

However, in Canada, the ILI consultation rate in week 1 was 47.2 consultations per 1,000 patients visits, which is down slightly compared to 51.4 per 1,000 in week 52. This rate is still within the expected levels for this time of year. The proportion of positive influenza specimens has increased since week 45 and now appears to be approaching the peak. Of the 1879 positive specimens reported during week 1, 473 specimens were reported as influenza A/H3N2 (all provinces except SK, MB, PEI, NS), 1326 as unsubtyped influenza A (all provinces except NB, PEI, NL), 44 as pandemic H1N1 2009 (AB, MB, ON, NB, PEI) and 36 as influenza B (AB, QC & ON). Since the beginning of the season, 93.2% of the subtyped positive influenza A specimens were for influenza A/H3N2. During week 1, the proportion of respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) decreased slightly to 9.5% of specimens tested while low levels of parainfluenza detections, adenovirus detections continue to be reported.

Worldwide, the winter influenza season is now under way in parts of the Northern Hemisphere. North America is seeing increases of influenza-like illness (ILI) now above baseline levels in parts of Canada and the United States associated primarily with influenza viruses A(H3N2) and type B. The United Kingdom has been experiencing a surge in both mild and severe cases, primarily associated with influenza A(H1N1) 2009 virus and to a lesser extent influenza type B. On the European continent, the Middle East and in northern Asia rates of influenza-like illness are low but recent increases have been noted in some areas. No significant influenza transmission has been reported in Southern Hemisphere temperate regions.

#### 1) Influenza Laboratory Data

Surveillance specimens are submitted by recruited New Brunswick Sentinel Practitioner Influenza Network (NB SPIN) practitioners, which are comprised of 1 site in Urgent Care, 8 sites in Emergency Rooms, 6 sites in Family Practice, 3 sites in First Nations communities, 1 site in a Nursing Home, 4 sites in Universities and 9 sites in Community Health Centres. Diagnostic specimens are submitted by physicians in the community/hospital setting. Influenza laboratory data is comprised of results from surveillance and diagnostic specimens. All laboratory specimens are tested using a real-time PCR assay, which is a rapid detection method designed for detection of all known variants of influenza A and B. All laboratory-confirmed cases are reported for the week when laboratory confirmation was received.

Graph 1: Number and percent of positive influenza specimens in New Brunswick, by week, up to January 8, 2011 (data source: G. Dumont lab results)



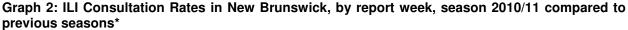
### 2) ILI Consultation Rates


A total of 40 practitioner sites (15 FluWatch sentinel physicians and 25 NB SPIN sites) are recruited this season to report the number of ILI patients and total patient consultations one day during a reporting week.

#### During week 1:

16 practitioner sites (6 FluWatch and 10 NB SPIN) reported a total of 10 cases of ILI of the 522 patients seen for any reason during this reporting period.

For week 1, the ILI consultation rate was 19.2 consultations per 1,000 patient visits which is a higher rate than the week before and below the expected levels for this time of year. The sentinel response rate was 40% for the FluWatch sentinel physicians and 40% for the NB SPIN practitioners.


