

WEEKLY NEW BRUNSWICK INFLUENZA REPORT

Reporting period: December 6 to December 12 2015 (week 49)

Summary: In New Brunswick, influenza activity remains low in week 49

New Brunswick:

- There have been 2 positive influenza detections during week 49, both influenza A (unsubtyped) viruses.
- The ILI consultation rate was 11.6 consultations per 1,000 patients visits, and was slightly below the expected level for week 49.
- No new influenza or ILI outbreaks were reported in week 49.

Canada:

- Influenza activity in Canada increased from previous week but overall remains low. Laboratory detections of influenza are below expected levels for this time of the year.
- Four new laboratory confirmed influenza outbreaks were reported in week 49, two were in long-term care facilities.
- So far this season, influenza A (H3N2) has been the most common subtype affecting Canadians.
- To date, the majority of influenza laboratory detections and hospitalizations have been in seniors greater than 65 years of age.
- 27 laboratory detections of influenza were reported during week 49, and the percentage of laboratory tests positive for influenza was 1.6%.
- The national ILI consultation rate was 21.0 consultations per 1,000 patients' visits for week 49, the highest ILI rate was found in the over 65 age group.
- Antigenic characterization: NML has antigenically characterized 54 H3N2 viruses, all of which showed a match to the vaccine strain, 16 A (H1N1)pdm09 that was a match to the vaccine strain and 21 B viruses, all of which were a match to the vaccine strain (quadrivalent).

International:


- Globally, influenza activity generally remained low in both hemispheres.
- <u>Human infection with Avian Influenza</u>: As of December 21 2015, a total of 685 laboratory-confirmed cases of human infection with an avian influenza A (H7N9) virus were reported in China (as well as in Taiwan, Hong Kong and Malaysia) including 275 deaths. The majority of cases have presented with severe acute illness, rapidly progressing to severe pneumonia. Most human cases have reported a history of exposure to poultry or live bird markets. There is currently no evidence of sustained human-to-human transmission of H7N9.
- Other Respiratory Viruses:
 - <u>MERS-CoV</u>: From September 2012 to December 21 2015, 1,621 laboratory-confirmed cases of MERS-CoV have been reported from 26 countries. All cases have either occurred in the Middle East or have a direct link to a primary case infected in the Middle East. Among the 1,621 cases, 584 were fatal. An outbreak in the Republic of Korea and has resulted in 186 cases including 36 deaths. This outbreak represents the largest nosocomial outbreak outside the Middle East.

1) Influenza Laboratory Data¹

- Influenza activity remains low.
- Two influenza detections were reported during week 49, both influenza A (unsubtyped) viruses.
- Since the beginning of the season, 5 positive influenza detections were reported, 2 influenza B and 3 influenza A (unsubtyped).

¹ Surveillance specimens are submitted by recruited New Brunswick Sentinel Practitioner Influenza Network (NB SPIN)practitioners, which are comprised of sites in Emergency Rooms, in Family Practice, in First Nations communities, in Nursing Home, in Universities and in Community Health Centers. Diagnostic specimens are submitted by physicians in the community/hospital setting. Influenza laboratory data is comprised of results from surveillance and diagnostic specimens. All laboratory specimens are tested using a real-time PCR assay, which is a rapid detection method designed for detection of all known variants of influenza A and B. All laboratory-confirmed cases are reported for the week when laboratory confirmation was received.



2) ILI Consultation Rates³

- During week 49, the ILI consultation rate was 11.6 consultations per 1,000 patients visits, and was slightly below the expected level for week 49.
- During week 49, the sentinel response rate was 34%, for both the FluWatch sentinel physicians and the NB SPIN practitioners.





⁴ Hospitalizations (including ICU admissions) are influenza associated; they may or may not be due to influenza.

⁵ Deaths are influenza associated; influenza may not be the direct cause of death.

⁶ In early January 2014, the Office of the Chief Medical Officer of Health implemented a new provincial surveillance system in collaboration with the Regional Health Authorities to monitor influenza-associated hospitalizations, intensive care unit admissions and deaths.
