

## Guide to Determining Location for Private Commercial Signage

- 1. Land Owner permission must be obtained before a sign can be installed on private property.
- 2. Depending on the classification of highway you wish to install your sign, different regulations will apply.
- 3. In order to install a sign on a major highway, also known as a level I and level II controlled access highways, formatted sign templates and specifications must be used. These signs are referred to as Private Formatted Signs.
- 4. Prior to installing a sign on any highway, approval from the Department of Transportation and Infrastructure (DTI) is required. Permits are also required and will be issued by DTI for signs located on Level I and Level II, Arterial and Collector highways. The fee for a Commercial Sign Permit is \$75 plus taxes. Information such as parcel identifier number (PID#), landowner, business to be signed, and sign manufacturer is required on the permit.
- 5. The following tools will help in identifying possible location and land owners.
  - Google Maps is beneficial at showing exit numbers, street views and distances. <u>https://maps.google.ca/maps?hl=en&tab=wl</u>
